(electrical engineering). Met and married my first wife Shirley in K Falls, but that marriage crashed and burned after 4 years.



As a co-author, another friend and I just completed an Arcadia Publishing book called Patrol and Rescue Boats on Puget Sound. It is a great collection of over 200 photos of the history of these boats from the early 1900 to the present on the Puget Sound. That will be published on December 12, 2011.

ohn Luchau had just written a story about a sail he made from the island of Oahu to Hilo on the big island and submitted it to the Saxon's Class of '63 mewsletter.** Learning that John lived on the Big Island of Hawaii where my husband and I recently purchased a condo, I thought it would be fun to "interview" John as an intro into his article. I met John for lunch at a tiny little Thai restaurant near Hilo close to where John lives with his wife, Christie. John, out of high school, became a career Navy man and retired in 1991. On his very first assignment in the Navy, he was stationed at Pearl Harbor in Honolulu. That was when he acquired his love for the Hawaiian Islands. When he retired, he bought property on the Big Island and, as he put it, "built a house from 1992 to forever." John has a 42' sailboat that he is currently restoring. He founded a sailing club in Hilo and frequently crews on other boats.

The name of the boat in his article is Mele Kai, which, in Hawaiian, means Song of the Sea. The journey he writes about is a 190 nautical mile trip from Honolulu to Hilo. By the time you adjust to the direction of the wind, he

explained, the boat travels more than 230 miles. I know enough about sailing to know that is a very long way in a 28' boat. The Alenuihaha channel between the southern end of Maui and the northern end of the Big Island is 40 miles of the most treacherous waters anywhere. Long voyages in a boat are nothing to John. He once sailed from Hawaii to Bremerton, Washington. Just the thought gives me apoplexy. I would have been clutching the mast with both hands, wearing goggles and a snorkel.

Learning of my husband's interest in sailing, he offered to take Dave sailing. Me too, if I can pry my hands off the mast. In the meantime, we met John and Christie at a 50's diner somewhat half-way between where they live south of Hilo and where our condo is on the Kona side of the island. Christie and I share an interest in both gardening and horses. Over time, I hope we can all share more time together. I have promised the newsletter gang that I'll get a picture of John at the helm of a sailboat. The Vitae Springs Road farm is long gone. Mom had a stroke and Dad was just worn out. He was able to sell it in the good times but they didn't know how to enjoy their freedom from cows and work very much. It was kind of sad that they didn't go anywhere or do much. Dad told me that he should have retired about 10 years earlier so they could have enjoyed the healthy times together. He died of lung cancer about 3 years ago. He had been hiding it from us all until he was on his deathbed. He went fast though and that was a blessing. Mom was living in assisted care in Salem for many years as her stroke did not allow her to swallow correctly so she had to have help moving around and had to eat puréed food for every meal. My sister Kay (SSHS 66) had moved back to Salem from Bend and cared for her the best she could. This past Christmas was the first time in years that we did not drive to Salem for the holidays. Kay is now moving from Salem to Sequim, WA, up here, trying to get her house sold in Salem.
