Jerry & Jaci Green's Journey

s we look forward to our 50th class reunions this summer one thing is certain..... we're all 50 years older! But what's it like to face UNcertainty? Surely we've all been there at one time or another. We've all had trials; maybe you've even walked a similar path as ours. The only thing truly unique about our story is that it happened to us.



In January 2011 we were excitedly packing for our move back to Oregon after living in southern California for nearly nine years. We made the decision that our grandkiddos were growing up too quickly and we'd already missed too much of their lives. Little did we know that a stranger would be accompanying us on our return trip.

Jerry hadn't been feeling well as we were readying to move but we chalked it up to stress. Nothing more than a nagging cough that would eventually go away, right? But instead it got worse and he was more fatigued than normal. A couple days after we arrived we decided he should see a doctor since we had a lot of work to do. Fortunately, we were able to schedule an appointment with a local doctor that same day who recommended Jerry have chest x-rays to rule out pneumonia. Two days later, based on those x-rays, he recommended Jerry see a pulmonologist. Miraculously, a cancellation the next day got us an appointment with one of Portland's top pulmonologists. Questions, more tests, blood work, etc. We figured he'd diagnose the problem, prescribe something and we'd be done with it.

Not so simple. His diagnosis was Pulmonary Fibrosis; something we'd never heard of; what's the treatment? Then the few words that changed our lives in an instant: the illness is incurable and the prognosis is a 3-5 year life expectancy. SHOCK.....could you repeat that? More questions but the answers were a blur; we can't even remember them. We needed time to absorb the reality of it. SURREAL: can this be happening? What do we do first? THINK: how do we tell our family? CRY, TALK, HUG, experience every emotion. RESEARCH: scour the Pulmonary Fibrosis website for information, reports, facts, statistics, anything that will help us get a grasp! ACCEPT: this is for real.

The past year and a half has been an incredibly long and rough roller coaster ride, encompassing every emotion imaginable, but which miraculously resulted in Jerry receiving a single donor lung on September 2, 2012. However, this is far from the end of our journey. The surgery saved his life but his recovery will be long and uncertain. He'll be on immunosuppressant drugs for the rest of his life, he'll remain at high risk for illness and infection and organ rejection is an ongoing possibility. Transplant recipients fondly refer to this change as the beginning of our "new normal" way of life.

As difficult as this journey has been, it's also been an incredibly eye-opening experience for us. We have a new awareness and appreciation of each new day, we've

V/ell, a lot has been going on **V** in my life since 1963. I have two children. A son, Ronny, lives in Palm Springs and my daughter, Betty, lives in North Dakota. I lived in Santa Cruz, CA for awhile and went into nursing. I also lived in

San Francisco. I then moved to Santa Fe, NM for five years. I then moved up north of Santa Fe, about 20 miles to Chimayo. I ended a 20-year nursing career and worked on an Indian reservation casino. I lived on a farm at the same time...cows, horses, dogs and cats. When I turned 50, I retired and traveled in an RV. I went to 20 states in five years. My favorite part was to live with the Blackfeet and Cree Native Americans during that time. And, yes, that includes traveling the pow-wow circuit. I did do some traditional dancing but never won anything. I then went to live in Las Vegas, NV. I worked in a casino there and loved it. We stayed there until March 2009. My husband, David, had to have a liver transplant, so we chose to move back to New Mexico. After living here in Albuquerque two months, David's liver healed. It was a true miracle of God. We love it here in Albuquerque and the doctors take good care of him. I guess my nursing job was a blessing as now I can take care of my husband. David now is doing well and is a house painter.

On Tuesdays I volunteer for the Roadrunner Food Bank. On Thursday I volunteer at a senior mobile home park and help with shopping. I have a great garden growing - squash, peppers, cucumbers, tomatoes, green beans and pumpkins. I have two dogs--a 3-year-old poodle and a 1-year-old Chinese Crested--and a 15-year-old cat.

September, October, and November are busy times in this area. There is the state fair in Albuquerque and a 4-day fiesta in Santa Fe in September. In October, there is the Navajo Fair and Rodeo and the Albuquerque Balloon Festival. In November there are several Feast Days at the 19 pueblo reservations, also Navajo, Zuni, and three Apache reservations in New Mexico. As that is part of my heritage, you can see why I'm partial to this state. I'm from the Blackfoot of Rocky Boy Indian Reservation on Bears Paw Mountain in Browning, Montana. I don't think I'll ever get back to Oregon. I have a lot of family there, but we really need to stay here.

Well, as you can see – a very interesting 49 years. It's nice to retire and be where I am really happy!

EARL HAMPTON
July 9, 1922 - October 6, 2012
Principal of Judson Junior High

arl Hampton was born in Eugene. He graduated from Molalla High School in 1940 and received an athletic scholarship to Willamette University. During his freshman year, the football team was in Hawaii when Pearl Harbor was attacked. The football team was recruited to perform guard duty and returned home on a hospital ship. When he got home, he joined the Navy and served for the duration of WWII.

He met Constance Bodeker at Molalla High School when he was on leave and she was teaching. They were married July 27, 1944. After the war, he earned his bachelor degree of science in education at Willamette, his master's degree at the UofO, and his doctorate from OSU.

Earl began his teaching career in Pendleton and then came to Salem, where he was assistant principal and then principal at Leslie Junior High School. He was the principal at Judson Junior High School when it opened in 1958. He then was assistant superintendent for Salem-Keizer School District. He then moved to Lincoln County and was superintendent there until his retirement in 1981. After his retirement he was interim superintendent for Redmond School District.

Connie and Earl retired to the home they built on the Little North Fork of the Santiam River and enjoyed the years they lived there. He loved to fish Oregon's rivers and streams and he loved digging for clams. They made many trips around the world and especially enjoyed their time in Australia.

Earl loved sports. During the 1940's, he played semipro baseball around the Northwest. He enjoyed watching football and baseball and until the day he died was a diehard OSU Beaver fan.
