






KEITH WONDERLY January 24, 1945 December 22, 2022

Leith Lavaur Wonderly passed away early Thursday morning, December 22, 2022, at the family farm in Philomath surrounded by his loved ones. He is survived

by his wife of nearly 55 years, Patricia "Patti" Nofziger Wonderly; Daughter Kristina Wonderly (Eric Lindquist) Jefferson OR; Son Daniel Wonderly (Jenn Holmes) Redondo Beach CA; Grandson Grady Holaday (Sierra) Philomath OR. Keith was born January 24, 1945 to Madell and Francis Wonderly. He was the youngest of three children and is survived by his two sisters Lucille Wonderly Reeck (Darrell) Newberg OR and Madell Wonderly Klauke (Peter, deceased) of Toronto, Canada, as well as multiple nieces and nephews and their children. Keith grew up in a fun-loving Christian family in Salem that shared a passion for music. As a youth, Keith sang with the Salem Singers and was the drum major in the band at South Salem HS where he graduated in 1963. After taking classes at local colleges in the NW, Keith joined the Naval Reserves in September 1965 and reported for active duty a year later. Prior to shipping out on his first tour, he proposed to his childhood sweetheart, Patti Nofziger. They were engaged while Keith served on the USS Canberra for two combat tours during the Vietnam War. Keith's ship returned to San Diego one month before he and Patti were married on June 22, 1968. After leaving the Navy, they settled in the San Diego area while Keith attended San Diego State University, graduating in 1974 with a BS degree in Telecom. They were actively involved with Skyline Wesleyan Church. These early years of their marriage built the foundation for a life-long commitment to God's work. Upon graduation, Keith and Patti were accepted as missionaries with OMS International. They moved to Michigan for cross cultural training where their daughter was born, followed by a year in Costa Rica for Spanish language school. In 1976, they settled into their new home in Bogota, Colombia where Keith served as the Multi-Media & Radio Producer for 5 years. While in Colombia, they expanded their family with the birth of their son. In 1981, Keith joined the Audio Visual staff at

OMS's International Office in Greenwood, IN. He eventually became director of that dept and served in that role until he retired after 25 years of service. In his free time, Keith also served as the lead sound engineer at their local church, Southport Presbyterian. With retirement came a call to return home to Oregon and settle at the Wonderly farm in Philomath OR in 2005. They were joined by their daughter and grandson. They spent the first couple of years remodeling the old farm house and eventually building their own home on the property. When not working at Home Depot and the Mennonite Village, Keith's real love was puttering around and maintaining the property on his orange Kubota tractor, being trailed by the two family dogs, Stuck and Speckles. Keith retired officially for the 2nd time in Jan. 2017. He and Patti enjoyed their retirement years with many miles of hiking, impromptu trips to the coast or mountains for breakfast and hosting epic family gatherings. They were also deeply connected with their church NW Hills in Corvallis. Keith was loved by many over the years.

Ron was born in Salem in 1944 to Orville & Paulee

Nichols. Ron graduated from South Salem High in 1963, and from Oregon State University in 1969. Ron was married to Cheryl (Hopkins) Nichols for nearly 55 years, most of them in the Salem/Keizer area. Ron designed parks for the City of Salem, served on Oregon's Landscape Architect Board. Ron worked for the City of Salem Parks Department for a few years before starting his own landscape business. He later sold the business and went to work managing the campus grounds at Willamette University. Ron retired from Willamette University in 2007 after 21 years.

Ron enjoyed the outdoors. He loved hunting, fishing, hiking, and gardening. Ron loved his Christian faith and hosted a fellowship meeting in his home in Keizer for many


# MARGARET CHRYSTINE "CHRYS" BUTLER KANSIER

Helen Tamera Whiteaker went by her middle name. We knew her as Tam, Tamera, and Tammy. Her 12 grandchildren and two great grandchil-

dren knew her as Grammy Tammy. She was born in a Naval Hospital in San Diego on January 21, 1944.

She moved to the Salem area and grew up outside of Salem and Graduated from South Salem High School.

At 24, she married Ray Mclain and moved to Las Vegas and had four children.

After they divorced, she moved back to Oregon. and threw herself into religious studies.

She attended a local church with her mother and sister. She became a soloist for Oregon and northern California church areas. if you knew her, you knew she could sing and you knew she had a very loud infectious laugh she was famous for.

She met William Whiteaker while they were members of the same Portland area church, after she sang special music for the service, he said to himself that he had to meet her.

They were married within a year after meeting. They lived in Portland, caretaking for a now known haunted house. Strange things happened in this house, so they had to move.

They had one daughter, Teah, while living in Portland.

Tamera served members of her church by singing at their weddings and funerals. She was an talented floral designer and always provided beautiful bouquets for every occasion. She would sing for them, and provide flowers, and plan the entire event for them, and then check up on them after the event to offer more help if it was needed. She was well known and deeply loved by the members of her church community.

She loved to travel the US with her family. They visited over half the states and saw the sights like the Grand Canyon and Mt Rushmore, driving in a wood paneled blue station wagon with a tear-drop trailer towing behind.

They moved to California and Tennessee then back to Oregon to live out their final years.

While they lived in Sacramento, California they became long term foster parents for special needs infants/toddlers. The first foster child they helped then adopted, while keeping a good relationship with his birth mother.

She was an avid log cabin quilt maker. Every child she had was made a quilt when they were married, and every grandchild was made a quilt. She gave quilting lessons throughout her life and taught her two daughters how to sew log cabin quilts.

When Tamera's' third son, Brad, was 21 he took his own life. This was a very tough time for her family but somehow it brought them closer.

In her last years with her husband, they cared for her adopted sons, first born daughter, Xylia Rane. From two months to three years, they cared for her daily. She had an extreme bond with her last-born granddaughter.

Tamera was a loyal and loving wife to her husband, William, and thoughtful mother to her own children, and many more children she fostered or just took in under her wing.

Tamera, the midwife, passed on Labor Day, September 5, 2022, holding her youngest daughters hand, one month after her husband, William of 46 years, passed. She told her daughter she did not want to be here without William. She was surrounded by women and a hospice nurse, singing her favorite songs, and celebrating her beautiful life.

She was survived by five of her children, Darran, Paul, Tara, Teah, and Thomas. Her grandchildren, Marissa, Bryan, Garrick, Caitlyn, Dakota, Logan, Kristian, Gavin, Arianna, Brandon, Ranae, and Xylia Rane and her great grandchildren Kieran and Addeline.




COETA EVANS MONTGOMERY September 17, 1945 -May 28, 2023

### SAXON SUCCESS FUND SCHOLARSHIPS AND KATHLEEN HANNEMAN SCHOLARSHIP

The Saxon Success Fund is a nonprofit organization made up of alumni and SSHS supporters wishing to transform South from a great Oregon high school through strategic investment. We raise funds for specific projects that have the greatest impact on the success of all Saxon students. Providing scholarships each year is one way we fulfill our mission. SSF has provided 40 scholarships to South Salem High School seniors since it began during the 2019-20 school year, each one in the amount of \$1000.

Donors have options for giving to a variety of funds within the SSF:

General fund: This fund is used for general scholarships and specific projects as they are identified.

Class of 60 Scholarship: At their 50th class reunion, the Saxon class of 60 began a scholarship fund and has awarded scholarships every year since. In 2021, they became affiliated with our efforts.

Class of 70 Scholarship: Taking the challenge of the class of 1960, the reunion goers at their 50th decided to also collect funds for scholarships. The first scholarships from the class of 1970 will go to the class of 2023.

Hanneman Scholarship: Longtime educator and educational leader, Kathleen Hanneman was a role model for many women leaders in the field of education. She was the first female to lead a large high school in the state of Oregon. In her memory, the Hanneman Scholarship fund confers scholarships to graduating girls pursuing a career in education.
